What does the plan require?

- General Info
 - Name, Address, Phone of responsible party
 - General Liability Ins.
- Project Info
 - Total Project Area
 - Disturbed Area
- Dust Assessment Info
 - Operations and Activities
 - Actual and Potential Sources of fugitive dust.



What does the plan require?

- Dust Mitigation Information
 - Primary Control Methods
 - Contingency Control Methods
 - Delivery, transport, and storage area
 - Permanent stabilization Method




When do I call for an Inspection?

- After the permit is issued and Wind Erosion Control plan has been approved.
- Call for an inspection after you have your BMPS up but before you are grading.



Stabilizing your site

- All areas that have been cleared of significant portion of vegetation and will remain for 30 days or longer without construction activity shall be seeded and mulched within 14 days of being disturbed.



Stabilizing your site

- Permanent stabilization is required once inactive period exceeds 60 days. 14 days with a SWPPP. There is no post inspection call, but you are still responsible to have it stabilized.



When your site is stable

- Make sure you remove the BMPs.
